Burn ban issued for city

Outside hot work requires permit

The city has followed Collin County in issuing a burn ban, according to fire offi-

The county recently issued a burn ban, and the McKinney Fire Department has instituted a burn ban and hot-work permit program for those performing hot

work or cutting and welding outdoors. There will be no fee for the permits, which are aimed at reinforcing the importance of increased awareness for

safety during the summer heat. Those found performing hot work without a permit will be subject to citations, according to Stacie Durham, McKinney Fire Department spokeswoman. Permits will be required until further notice.

The burn ban issued along with the

hot-work permitting program pertains to all trench burning and recreational fires. Recreational fires are those used for warmth, pleasure, religious, ceremonial, cooking or other purposes. That includes the use of a fire pit or campfire. During the time the burn ban is in effect, the only exception will be a barbeque grill or pit used exclusively for cooking.

Permits for hot work will be issued at the Public Safety Building, located at 2200 Taylor Burk Drive, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.
